 - Erin Golembewski:
 - The Rise Up Team had a NSF a virtual site visit on May 2, 2024. This was a part of an initiative to diversify and attract faculty to the STEM field.
 - UMB will host the master's and certificate ceremony on Wednesday, May 15, 2024, while the PhD ceremony will take place on Thursday, May 16, 2024.
 - The GRC occurred on Friday, April 12, 2024. There were 200 attendees and 99 presenters.

 - UMB's Presidential Address occurred on May 1, 2024. There was a focus on the potential for AI applications across UMB's domain and discussions on how UMB can continue to improve itself as an anchor institute for West Baltimore.

- Janet Rutledge:

- NA new policy was proposed by Dr. Tanya Sanders which would allow students whose dissertations are relevant to non-English research to write their comprehensive exams and dissertation in a non-English language when sound academic reasons are provided, and the academic resources are available.
 - A slightly different version being proposed by Dr. Craig Saper allows non-English to be present in a dissertation when it quotes information, key terms, and other important information. The non-English information being presented must have a focus on translating the bulk of information into English.
 - The policies were reviewed and discussed but not approved by the full Graduate Council.
